Last year, several important changes occurred. This and a "Table of Organization", will be updated at each board meeting and made available on our website at www.american-rhinologic.org. Our Patient Advocate Committee (formerly known as the socioeconomic committee) headed by Joe Jacobs (NYC, NY) will continue to sort through the economic challenges confronting our patients.

Martin Citardi (Cleveland, OH), has spent many hours creating and improving the ARS website. The ARS e-abstract module will soon have additional improvements that will facilitate "turn-around-time", for abstract acceptance. Moreover, he is working to establish e-commerce for our society so that physicians can renew their membership online as well as eventually register for meetings. During the past year Fred Kuhn (Savannah, GA), Mike Sillers (Birmingham, AL) and Martin Citardi spent many evening hours and days away from home as representatives of our society for the revision of the practice expense component of Medicare RVU's. Jim Hadley (Rochester, NY) has worked hard to establish and maintain our By-laws and Policy and Procedure manual so as to reflect improvements acted upon at each of three Board of Directors meetings that are held annually. His experience as pastpresident of the AAOA and his work with the Sinus & Allergy Health Partnership has him well poised to act as program chair for the 2003 COSM in Nashville, TN and the Annual meeting in Orlando, FL. I would also like to thank Marvin Fried (NYC, NY) for stepping up to the plate and taking on a huge job as secretary and doing it well. He and his assistant Wendi Perez have worked very hard to bring this society into the 21st century. Also we must congratulate Brent Senior (Chapel Hill, NC) for taking the excellent work of J. David Osguthorpe (Charleston, SC) to a new height in producing this newsletter.

The winners of this year's ARS Research Award at COSM were Mobeen A. Shirazi, B.S., James M. Chow, M.D., James A. Stankiewicz, M.D., M. Rita I. Young, Ph.D., for their work in the "Analysis of Blood Leukotriene Levels in Aspirin Sensitive and Nonaspirin Sensitive Patients". In addition to this award and the Cottle Award that is given during the Annual meeting, we have instituted a new award to attract greater international interests in our society. "The International Rhinology Research Award" for the best international clinical or basic science research is valued at \$1,000.00 and will be granted at our annual meeting. Additionally, the ARS offers research grants annually which are offered as part of the C.O.R.E. initiative that has been established through the AAO-HNS. Our ARS representatives, Bradley Marple (Dallas, TX) and Thomas Tami (Cincin-

nati, OH) and Thomas McCaffrey (Tampa, FL), continue to invest considerable time and effort in this review process. Two such grants were given this year, one to Karen Fong (Portland, OR) for her research in olfaction the other to Martin Citardi for his work in eosinophils. These ARS research grants could not exist if it were not for the efforts of Paul Toffel who is responsible for raising more than \$290,000.00 in research dollars from

our corporate affiliates. He also began initiatives that jump-started our committee structure when he was chair of the Committee on committees. Furthermore, I would like to thank Dr. Toffel for his distinguished stewardship of the ARS during the past year as our president. While acknowledging Dr. Toffel it is import to thank his Administrative Assistant, Susan Arias, who has been an important resource for this Society in all its recent transitions.

Finally, I would like to thank Charlie Gross (Charlottesville, VA), Mike Benninger (Detroit, MI) and Fred Kuhn who were members of the nominating committee the year I was elevated to Second-vice President. 2002 ARS Grants and Awards

The ARS is pleased to announce the awarding of two research grants for 2002.

The \$25,000 New Investigator Research Grant has been awarded to Karen J. Fong, M.D., Oregon Health and Science University for her project entitled "Influence of Estrogen on Maturation of Olfactory Neurons."

A second New Investigator Research Grant has also been awarded for 2002. This award, for \$20,000, has been presented to Martin J. Citardi, M.D., Cleveland Clinic Foundation for his project entitled "Characterization of Eosinophil Peroxidase-Induced and Myeloperoxidase-Induced Tissue Damage in Sinonasal Polyposis and Chronic Rhinosinusitis."

Congratulations Dr. Fong and Dr. Citardi.

The ARS received four applications for the 2002 New Investigator's Research Grant and three applications for the 2002 Resident Research Grant through CORE (Centralized Otolaryngology Research Efforts). No applications were selected this year to receive a Resident Research Award.

The American Rhinologic Society, in collaboration with the American Academy of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery Foundation's CORE, will again sponsor two categories of grant award for the 2003 grant cycle – New Investigator and Resident Research.

The New Investigator \$25,000 award is open to a promising investigator who is not a current recipient of a major research grant. This award is active for up to two years and requires the mentorship of an established investigator. Two Resident Research awards, each in the amount of \$8,000,

are available. These awards are for a period of one year. Residents applying for this award must be an ARS member or candidate and must have an ARS member as a co-investigator.

ARS members of CORE's Study Section review all applications. Review criteria include project significance, scientific approach/methodology, and feasibility. Each applicant will receive a summary statement detailing the reviewers' comments. Recipients of ARS research grants are required to submit a final project status and financial report, and present the findings of their research at a national meeting of the ARS. Publication of results is expected with the ARS having the right of first refusal through its official journal *The American Journal of Rhinology*.

Applications and directions for submission are available at the AAO-HNSF's web site, www.ent.org, under Research. It is anticipated that online submission of applications will be available for 2003. Questions should be directed to Ms. Fareen Pourhamidi (703) 684-4293.

ARS Internet Update

At its last meeting (held at COSM 2002), the ARS **Board of Directors approved a** plan to develop an e-Commerce Module for the ARS website (www.american-rhinologic.org). This project represents a major expansion of the ARS Internet efforts. Once deployed, the e-Commerce module will permit members to pay dues, update their membership files and register for meetings via the Internet. The new module will greatly facilitate member services, and simultaneously reduce transaction costs.

After deployment, the e-Commerce Module will assign each member unique login name and password for access to the site. In addition, members will be able to select the means through which they receive dues notices, etc. In this way, the e-

Commerce module will generate contact with members via E-mail, fax, or even regular mail. Of course, members will be encouraged to use the E-mail route. Members will be able to sign into the system at any time through any Internet connection. All financial transactions will be processed through a secure server system. The e-Commerce Module will process dues payments and meeting registration.

The e-Commerce module builds upon revisions to the ARS Administration Module, another web-based application through which member files are maintained. The ARS web site supports a virtually unlimited number of user profiles—which means that each user can be assigned a unique set of functions. Currently, these functions are mostly limited to administration tools, but the e-Commerce Module will expand this so that members can access their member profiles. Future functions can be added later.

The ARS Internet presence now includes:

- · its public web site (which contains both patient and member information), E-mail services (for the receipt of E-mail, as well as the generation of bulk E-mail to members and other groups)
- \cdot Administration Module (for the maintenance of membership functions)
- e-Abstract Module (an Internet-based system for submission and review of abstracts)
- · e-Survey Module (an internet-based system for survey site users)



The ARS web effort is closely coordinated with the ARS newsletter, whose articles serve as content for much of the public information posted on the web site. Periodic site updates include material originally written for the newsletter. Additional information is posted regularly.

The e-Commerce module depends upon the accuracy of the member info in the ARS database. The ARS Membership Committee has undertaken an effort to update this database. All members are asked to help with the work of the Membership Committee

In recognition of the growing web efforts, the ARS BOD approved a proposal to formally create the ARS Information Technology Committee, which will be lead by the ARS Information Technology Officer. Jay Dutton, MD recently joined this new committee

and is coordinating the development of new material that will be based on data generated by the e-Survey module.

Wildfire Internet (<u>www.wildfire.net</u>) serves as the ARS web host and developer. Wildfire is currently building the e-Commerce module. After initial testing, deployment is anticipated with 6-9 months.
