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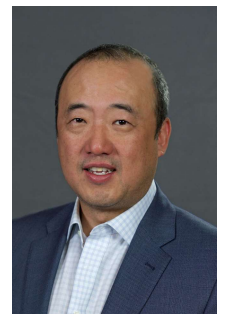
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President's Report

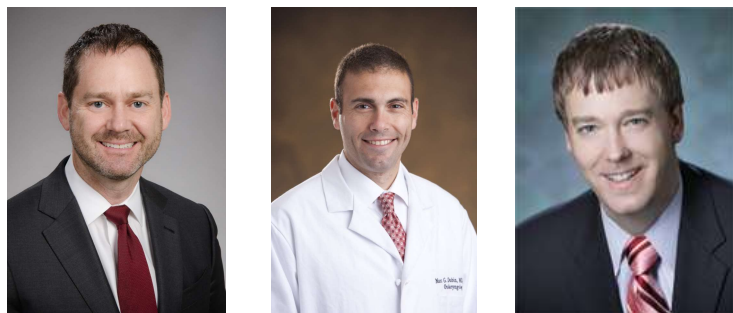

The Allergy and Immunology in Rhinology Section (AIR) is rounding out its first official year. At the Fall meeting, we will be announcing newly voted in general council members at the AIR section meeting.

AIR section members have been busy on several fronts. The section supported 2 publications that have been accepted for publication in IFAR. Lauren Roland, MD, FARS et al. in which Jean Kim, MD, PhD, FARS served as the corresponding author published a Viewpoint article in IFAR entitled "Biologics for chronic rhinosinusitis with nasal polyps: Economics and ethics." We will be exploring the question of healthcare economics in CRSwNP management in a combined ARS/AAOA panel discussion moderated by Mickey Stewart, MD, MPH, FARS. Senior authors Josh Levy, MD, FARS and Amber Luong, MD, PhD, FARS shepherded the recently accepted Viewpoint article "What is Allergic Fungal Sinusitis: A Call to Action".



Under additional leadership, there are several future projects planned. Of course, the section will continue to help shape ARS meetings with panel suggestions. Additional initiatives include a resident engagement and education activity with focus on allergy and immunology topics. Also, we are at the planning stage of developing a multi-disciplinary workshop with outreach to other professional societies on allergic fungal rhinosinusitis. Finally, the recent dramatic weather and climate have sparked talks about how these events may be affecting the upper airway. Daniel O'Brien, MD, FARS will initiate framing this potentially vast project.

Research and Grants Committee Update

It is with bittersweet feelings that I write this report for Nose News as the outgoing chair of the Research and Grants Committee. Over my past six years as chair I have seen many positive changes both within the committee and the rhinologic research community as a whole. The steady hand of the American Rhinologic Society (ARS) executive leadership has enabled and supported a dramatic growth in the number of grants as well as the total dollars offered. In 2016 the only two grant mechanisms advertised were the New Investigator Grant and the Resident Research Grant for a total amount of \$41,000. In contrast, the 2021 grant cycle offered three additional grants including the Friends in Research Grant, ARS Consortium Grant, and the Women in Rhinology Grant sponsored by Xoran, for a total of \$145,000. The efforts on the part of the society to enhance the grant offerings led to a commensurate increase in interest in submissions as the total letters of intent increased from 16 in 2016 to 33 in 2021. In addition to these enhanced funding opportunities, potential awardees now also have access to unique mentorship opportunities which began as a bespoke program organized by Dr. Corinna Levine and have now blossomed into an independent ARS committee under the leadership of Dr. Murray Ramanathan with its own independent funding source from GSK cultivated by Dr. Brent Senior. I could not be prouder of the ARS community as they have embraced each of these research opportunities offered and made great strides in our understanding of Chronic Rhinosinusitis. As I now pass on the chair responsibilities to Dr. Vijay Ramakrishnan, I am grateful to all the committee members who have donated their time and expertise over the past six years, and I am looking forward to seeing all the great things to come.



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Announcing the Shikani International Rhinology Award

The ARS is excited to announce the creation of the Shikani International Rhinology Award! This generous gift from long time ARS Fellow, Dr. Alan Shikani creates an annual award will be granted to a clinician or scientist located outside the United States who has made a significant, creative and/or transformative contribution to Rhinology.

Dr. Shikani is a fellow of the American Rhinologic Society, the American Academy of Otolaryngology – Head and Neck Surgery, the American College of Surgeons, and the Triologic Society. He earned the Maurice H. Cottle Award for Clinical and Basic Research in Rhinology in 2003. He has been a “Top Doc” in Maryland for numerous years. He is the founder and director of the Maryland ENT Center and the Maryland Nose & Sinus Center Rhinology Fellowship Program in Baltimore.



The Shikani awardee will be selected from the accepted international submissions for oral presentation at the Annual Fall Meeting of the American Rhinologic Society. The applicant must submit a manuscript and application three months prior to the meeting. The awardee will be notified one month ahead of the meeting.

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Dupilumab and AFRS and CRSsNP Phase 3 Studies

Primary chronic rhinosinusitis (CRS) is a common disorder in the general population; several subtypes exist including chronic rhinosinusitis with nasal polyps (CRSwNP), chronic rhinosinusitis without nasal polyps (CRSsNP) and allergic fungal rhinosinusitis (AFRS). Recently, CRSwNP treatments with biologics such as omalizumab, mepolizumab and dupilumab have been evaluated in successful clinical trials demonstrating efficacy. Given success of dupilumab, a monoclonal antibody targeting interleukin-4 and -13, it is being investigated for treatment of AFRS and CRSsNP which have similar type 2 inflammation. AFRS is an uncommon type 2 inflammatory disorder against fungi with regional variations in prevalence; a trial of ~120 AFRS patients with recurrent nasal polyps is currently actively enrolling across the United States and is estimated to complete May 2023 ([NCT04684524](https://clinicaltrials.gov/ct2/show/study/NCT04684524)). A second trial in AFRS is also planned aimed at starting dupilumab immediately after sinus surgery. CRSsNP has several inflammatory endotypes, including type 2 inflammation similar to CRSwNP; a two part trial of ~240 patients is currently actively enrolling across the United States and is estimated to complete September 2023 ([NCT04678856](https://clinicaltrials.gov/ct2/show/study/NCT04678856)).

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Obituary

Dr. George Wesley Facer, 83 years old, and a past president of our society, died on September 24, 2020. Dr. Facer was born in Millbury, Ohio, to Elsie Kiel Facer and Clyde Facer. He is survived by his devoted wife of 53 years, Pat Facer, daughters Dr. Michelle Facer (Dr. Eric Etzel), Dr. Carla Facer (Greg Armstrong), granddaughter Madison Etzel, grandson Parker Etzel, and several nieces and nephews. He received his BSc and MD from Ohio State University. Dr. Facer completed Otolaryngology residency training at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, and served as a Major in the Army at Fort Leonard Wood, MO. He was on the staff at Mayo Clinic Rochester, Mayo Clinic Arizona and Mayo Graduate School of Medicine where he was Professor of Otorhinolaryngology. Dr. Facer was noted for his work with chronic ear disease, otosclerosis, and significant hearing loss, founding the Cochlear Implant Program at Mayo Rochester. He was most passionate about giving the gift of hearing to thousands of individuals. He was a pioneer in promoting and supporting women in medicine and an advocate for always doing the right thing regardless of the personal cost. He was an intelligent, generous, caring, and gentle man who taught numerous physicians not only the technical skills required to be a surgeon, but the art of being a humble, kind and compassionate physician. His patients were amazed by his ability to recall so many details about their personal life. It was his fervent hope that this would continue into the future of medicine. He was a member of numerous medical societies and professional organizations continuing his memberships until his death. He was an avid hunter and fisherman, taking only animals that were on his cooking menu. He was an enthusiastic Ohio State University fan but more importantly was a family man. He passed on his love of fishing, sports, and the outdoors to his daughters and grandchildren, but his greatest gift was teaching everyone to be better people. George was preceded in death by his son, Michael, his brothers Walter and James, and his sisters Ruth and Carolyn. Memorial donations may be made to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital
